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Culture and Evaluation Interest Group

- Group established in 2016 under SO3 with UNESCO as convener
- Members: GEF, ILO, UNDP, ITC, PBSO, UNHCR
- Purpose: Applying principles of CRE in evaluation practice in order to ensure that the influence of culture on human behaviour is taken into consideration during all stages of evaluation



The Group's Work to Date

- Early 2017: Commissioning of discussion paper on Culturally responsive evaluations in and outside the UN system
- 2017 AGM: decision to develop a practical and flexible toolkit for culturally responsive evaluations
- Early 2018: Concept Note for the Development of Culturally Responsive Criteria for Evaluations



Purpose of Concept Note

CRE as Evaluative Criteria

The extent to which the evaluation acknowledges and responds to the values, norms, beliefs and the sociocultural contexts within which the policy, programme and/or project is implemented. This requires evaluators to be sensitive and responsive to the cultural context in which the policy, programme and/or project is operationalized at all stages of the evaluation process, particularly in instances when the participants' culture is known to have a major influence on outcomes.



Using CRE Criteria

Examples of questions for each evaluation stage:

- **Design:** Does the evaluation identify important cultural groups and their differences?
- Implementation: Are cultural protocols and norms observed when undertaking data collection and fieldwork in-country?
- Analysis/Reporting: Does the evaluation examine outcomes through different cultural lenses?
- Dissemination: Is the chosen medium appropriate?



Conditions for CRE use

- Consider CRE already during evaluability assessment stage
- Sample questions:
 - Is CRE integral to the purpose of the evaluation?
 - What information do potential users need?
 - Are CRE criteria useful or appropriate for this particular context?
 - Which CRE criterion will be most useful, considering available resources?





Examples of Applicability

- Valuing indigenous knowledge
- Addressing inadequate attention to power and privilege
- Normative work, conventions on cultural diversity and heritage
- Moving beyond treating gender as a head count issue
- Immersing in social and cultural context to understand lives and experiences of
